## BRINGING THE BLACK DOG TO HEEL WITH A TOP END TOUR

More than 30 motorcycle enthusiasts from across QLD will depart from Moreton Bay on Saturday 11th August for an epic interstate adventure to raise awareness of mental health and suicide prevention.

The QLD leg of Black Dog Ride's Top End 2018 mental health campaign will roll out of Old Petrie Town at 9.30am and cover around 4000 kilometres over seven days before reaching Darwin, where they meet with hundreds of likeminded Black Dog Riders from around Australia to celebrate the power of conversations in mental health recovery.

The QLD Black Dog Riders, men and women ranging in age from 39 to 64, will be meeting with communities in Bundaberg, Mackay, Charters Towers, Mt Isa and Tennant Creek, fostering a safe space to talk about mental illness and suicide and encouraging help seeking behaviours. On Friday 17<sup>th</sup> August, more than 300 Black Dog Riders from around the country will ride en masse for the final leg into Darwin. Black Dog Ride's Top End 2018 Finale Celebration will be held at Darwin's iconic Croc Cove.

Black Dog Ride began in 2009 as a ride to raise awareness of depression, and has evolved into a national health promotion charity involving thousands of Australians with lived experience of mental illness and suicideation who inspire the nation with their passion for preventing suicide. Black Dog Ride's community health projects are amongst the largest of their kind in Australia that are organised, conducted and involve participants with lived experience. Black Dog Ride does not receive any government funding.

Funds raised during the trip will be used to benefit grass roots community mental health projects throughout Australia. So far Black Dog Ride has raised more than \$2.5 million for mental health and suicide prevention programs nationwide, including Lifeline Australia's Crisis Support Chat service, Men's Sheds, training 1000 youth in teen Mental Health First Aid, Samaritans Crisis Support Service, and local Headspace Centres.

# KEY MESSAGING Black Dog Ride to the Top End 2018 Date of Activity: Friday 10th August 2018 to 18<sup>th</sup> August 2018 Location: Australia Wide

### Depression and Suicide:

- Suicide is the leading cause of death in Australians under the age of 45
- 8 Australians take their lives every single day, that's 1 life taken every 3 hours
- It is estimated that there is a suicide attempt every 10 minutes in Australia
- 80% of all suicides in Australia are by men, but the number of women suiciding is increasing
- 20% of Australians will experience a mental illness every year
- Mental illness is the leading cause of disability in Australia
- Depressive disorders are the most common identifiable risk factor for suicide

#### Black Dog Ride to the Top End 2018:

- Black Dog Ride was established in 2009 by WA businessman Steve Andrews who rode his motorcycle solo around Australia in 26 days to raise awareness of depression
- Black Dog Ride was incorporated as a national mental health charity in 2014
- Since 2010, Black Dog Ride has organised annual motorcycle rides in every corner of Australia to engage communities around mental health awareness and suicide prevention
- Black Dog Ride's community health projects are amongst the largest of their kind in Australia that are organised, conducted and involve participants with lived experience
- Black Dog Ride is raising funds to support mental health projects, particularly in regional Australia
- Participants will carry the Black Dog Ride Mascot 'Winston' on their bikes a soft toy black dog
  named after Sir Winston Churchill, who famously diarised about being hounded by the 'black dog of
  depression'. Winston helps Black Dog Riders start conversations about depression
- Black Dog Ride encourages people experiencing mental illness to reach out for support to friends and seek assistance from medical practitioners
